I respectfully told them that there wasn't any going back but well, they wouldn't agree. So my father came to school the next day to talk it out and Alhamdulillah things worked out somehow.

Not that I'm a good Muslim at all but this starter serves to depict how Ramadan has a profound effect on all Muslims around the globe. With this month, Allah popens the doors for us to better ourselves. He closes the gates of the Hellfire and chains up the devils. Excuses become less, and the capacity to change increases. So let's not let this month go by without telling ourselves on Eid day: "That was the best Ramadan

I've ever had."

So how can we bring about ourselves to doing it? How can we challenge ourselves to make this the Ramadan to remember for the rest of the year? For that, we have to do a few things:

Attitude

Tell yourself, clear and loud, 'I am going to do whatever it takes to make this my best Ramadan!' Before you can accomplish anything, you need to have the mindset that you will accomplish everything.

Clean up your time

Spending a lot of time on the internet or social media, even if visiting Islamic sites, really takes hours without notice. Minimise your internet usage by just checking emails/stuff once a week (Ok, ok, once a day). Especially no watching videos or playing games as we all know how addictive they are. The more we indulge in them, the more they attract us towards themselves.

Say no to shopping and too much sleeping

Markets are places which attract a person towards this world. So while we reduce all other time wasters, shopping should be on top of our list. Please have all your shopping done well before Ramadan. Our pious predecessors even used to cut less their sleeping time in Ramadan, Subhan'Allah, so as to make the most of every moment of this blessed month.

Set long and short-term goals

Do what's in your capacity to read more of the Quran, to visit the Masjid, to stop that habit that you know is wrong or build a new, better habit. But, just to make sure that you're in check, split up your goals into weeks and days because a goal with a long deadline usually doesn't get done.

"I will finish reading 3 Qurans this Ramadan Insha'Allah, and I will do so by reading 3 juz (para) every day." A key tip for making sure they get done is writing them down, something found in the next part:

Mark a schedule

Every day, a certain amount of progress must be made be it having read the Quran, making spe-

cial duas, especially in Tahajjud, giving in charity, memorising surahs and duas etc. Mark it all in your schedule as well as write down if you plan to attend a certain religious gathering on certain days (try to get out of your comfort zone and meet other Muslims in your community). Keeping these things on paper will allow you to visually see them and accommodate yourself accordingly so you won't compromise on your goals.

May Allah choose us to be amongst those for whom their fasts will intercede on the Day of Judgment and say, "My Rabb, I deprived him of eating and curtailing his desires, so permit me to intercede for him." And the Quran will say: "I deprived him of his sleep, so permit me to intercede for him." To this, both will be given the permission to intercede

Do you remember who you were before the world around you told you who you should be? Company matters!

An excerpt from a spiritual discourse by

Hadhrat Maulana Abdul Sattar Hafidhahullah

Translation by Bint Aftab

The Quran warns and instructs the Muslims, "O you who have believed, fear Allah and be with those who are true." (At-Taubah: 119)

Allah tells us to stick with those who are true in words and deeds, who are honest with themselves and with Allah. These people, who are steadfast in their obedience of Allah and unwavering in their journey on the Straight path, will ensure that we are inspired to be better Muslims, and one of the blessings of their company will undoubtedly be

that when we commit sins (because we are humans and even with good company the risk for sinning is as high as ever) we will be encouraged to make Tauba, to ask forgiveness of our Allah for falling off the straight path. Redemption, after all, is only possible if a person knows that he has done something wrong, and if we adopt the company of the pious our conscience will constantly remind us what our real purpose of living is. It will remind us that there are people like us, humans, living in the same world of temptation and enticement, but who man-



age to live in obedience of Allah ...

There lies a chasm between people who spend their days in the company of the pious, who frequently spend time at a Masjid or Madrassah, who befriend people with the intention of learning how to bow before Allah 's's command; and those whose names and identity cards may classify them as Muslims, but they have no connection with the Quran, they do not visit Masjids and dislike the company of Ahl-e-deen; nothing about their appearance, lifestyle or personality links them in any way with Islam. Because these two groups of people are vastly different, their lives, their ambitions, aims and ways of thinking and living are on opposite ends of a spectrum.

This is because the danger of the young generation escaping into the wrong hands, and following the wrong path, is far greater than we realise, especially in this day and age. There was a time when it would take years for a person to change their way of thinking, to revolutionise their lifestyle. Modernisation, liberalisation that would take years to happen, now happens in months, if not weeks. The child you trust so fearlessly will take only a few months of bad company to transform into someone you do not recognise and connect with.

Children, teenagers and youngsters are yet innocent, their personalities half-shaped and their minds still fresh and susceptible to influence, bad or good. And the resources available to them are

This is because the danger of the young generation escaping into the wrong hands, and following the wrong path, is far greater than we realise, especially in this day and age

And this chasm is absolute and unchangeable. So many times a mother and a daughter, or a father and a son are unrecognizable in their relation to each other because they stand on opposite sides of a deep and wide abyss. Their lifestyles and philosophies are irreconcilable, because one of them is liberal and deeply entrenched in the matters of dunya, while the other is conservative and religious and lives in the manner of his pious friends and teachers. Two people who carry the same blood within their veins are so different from each other, because one of them was exposed to the wrong company, to the wrong environment and the wrong tarbiyah.

So dear readers, it is a necessity of this time that our children, our daughters and sons, our brothers and sisters, are given the right environment, the right company and the right tarbiyah. It is necessary that they be connected with a religious institution, a masjid or a madrassah, that they have proper spiritual mentors and friends who are more concerned about doing good deeds and staying away from bad habits, who are more concerned about the state of Muslims across the world rather than the state of the international sports leagues.

immense and unlimited. And most of the time these resources have a bad influence on their personality and character. The media in this age is slowly rotting the minds of our youth; social media and the internet is instilling in them a doubt of their religion, wearing away their Imaan until they are only left with questions and reservations about Islam. They do not trust the word of their elders, they do not trust the directives of our deen, they do not understand the lifestyle and philosophy that Islam advocates. And it is the people they follow, the teachers they learn from, the friends they make through this media that lead them to the point that they do not want to follow the deen that they were born with.

Separating salt and pepper

What's the quickest way to separate salt and pepper? Let static electricity do the work! One of the classic static electricity experiments, this salt and pepper separation demonstration will fascinate you. Even better, everything you need can probably be found in your kitchen.

What You Need:

- Salt
- Pepper
- Plastic spoon
- · Wool cloth or clothing

What You Do:

- 1. Measure about a teaspoon of salt and a teaspoon of pepper. Then, use the spoon to mix them together as well as you can.
- 2. Rub the plastic spoon on a piece of wool cloth. As we rub the spoon, we are giving the plastic spoon a negative charge. Something that's negatively charged will attract the positive particles in different objects.
- 3. Hold the spoon about an inch above the pile of salt and pepper. Both salt and pepper will be attracted to the spoon, but pepper is lighter, so if you hold the spoon in the right place, the pepper should jump up and cling to the spoon!

As she did sajdah, all of a sudden she felt peaceful. She knew her Rabb was close. Hamna was experiencing overwhelming peace, for His infinite mercy.








































Zawjah Junaid Mukaty tells us about a daring young girl who endured the harshness of Abu Jahal yet didn't tell him where Rasulullah was hiding during migration. It was none else but Hadhrat Asma bint Abu Bakar

Hadhrat Asma bint Abi Bakar was one of those fortunate Muslim women whose father, grandfather, husband and her children all were companions of Prophet . She was the daughter of the first Caliph, Hadhrat Abu Bakar rta and elder half-sister of Hadhrat Aisha , mother of the believers. She was amongst the top twenty who accepted Islam.

Before Hijrah

When Prophet and Hadhrat Abu Bakar were forced to hide in Cave Thaur during their migration to Madinah, Hadhrat Asma served them very courageously. She tore her nitaq, the clothing that women in those days tied on their waists, into two and hid the food in those belts and carried it at night to the cave. Prophet made a dua for her and said that May Allah replace these two pouches that you have brought with the two from Paradise. Since then she was known as Zat ul Nitaqayn (She of the Two Belts).

Kuffar wanted to know about the whereabouts of the Prophet . That day Abu Jahal stopped her way and forced her to tell about the hiding place of her father on which she kept silence. Abu Jahal got furious and slapped her brutally such that her necklace fell down but this brave and steadfast woman bore all the pain and did not tell him about the Prophet and her father.

Abu Quhafa, her grandfather had not accepted Islam before Hijrah. He had not liked Hadhrat Abu Bakar leaving his family behind in Makkah. He asked his granddaughters what their father had left behind for them. Hadhrat Asma quickly brought a tray full of stones covered with a velvet cloth and put her old, blind grandfather's hand on it to prove him that there were gold coins to take care of them. There is no doubt she was a great woman. May Allah grant us the little bit of goodness that these people had.

She married Hadhrat Zubair bin Awwam shortly before Hijrah.

As a Wife

Hadhrat Zubair bin Awwam was a poor man. He had left everything behind in Makkah and the only thing that he had was a horse. But Hadhrat Asma was very happy to be with him as he was a very good man who looked after her very well. She served her husband with her heart and soul. She prepared the hay for the horse and fed it ground date-stones. She brought these datestones from her husband's land, which was two miles away from her house and then grinded them. She also went to fetch water and brought it back on her head. She was not good at making bread but Hadhrat Zubair never complained. She once said that the women of Ansaar were very helpful, they used to prepare the bread for her. She was an example of a hard working woman. After the conquest of Makkah, Hadhrat Zubair was blessed with a lot of wealth and it is said that he died a rich man.

Her first son Abdullah was born after Hijra and he was the first child to be born after Hijra. She would do such good tarbiah of her children that people used to give examples of her upbringing of children.

A Generous Woman

Her generosity mostly affected her slaves. Whenever she fell sick, she used to free her slaves. She never kept the wealth to herself but made sure to distribute it as soon as possible. Hadhrat Abdullah, her son, once said that my mother and my aunt never waited for excess to give charity as there will never be excess, give what you have and the excess will come.

Her mother was a non-Muslim. Once her mother

came to Madinah with gifts for her. Hadhrat Asma refused to accept them as she didn't accept gifts from non-Muslims. Her mother forced her to take them so she went to her sister, Hadhrat Aisha , to ask the Prophet regarding what she should do. Hadhrat Muhammad @ gave her the permission to accept the gifts and it was only then that she took

A Courageous Woman

Hadhrat Asma participated in the Battle of Yarmouk with her husband and son. The women in those days used to go with their men to give them moral support, serve them and takecare of their wounds and bruises. She played an important role in this battle serving the Muslims.

But the real courage that Hadhrat Asma 🙈 showed was when she was hundred years old in 73 Hijrah. At that time, the pain and agony that she endured was shocking. Her son Abdullah was facing Hajjaj bin Yousuf's army. Hadhrat Asma supported her son and advised him to be steadfast. Hadhrat Abdullah fought bravely until he was martyred. She kept herself composed though she was at a very old age.

This daring lady died ten days after her son in Makkah. Her grave is in Makkah's famous graveyard, Jannat ul Mu'ala. It is reported that she had not lost her memory and had a full set of teeth at this age too. She is said to be the last one among Muhajireen to leave this world.

May Allah shower his blessings upon these great personalities and may Allah help us to follow their footsteps. Ameen

Everything in this world has some purpose for its creation. Crops are grown for mankind to eat from them. Animals are also created for the same purpose. Trees are created for us to provide shade. Same way there are millions of other things on earth which we even do not know but Allah has created them for some purpose because He knows everything of His creations as the Quran Kareem says: "Indeed it is He (Allah) who is the Hearing, the Knowing." (Al-Anfal: 61)

Likewise, Allah has created prophets to spread his message to the rest of the world, e.g. Hadhrat Nuh was sent to preach to the people of Nuh, Hadhrat Hud to the people of Aad, Hadhrat Musa to the people of Bani Israel. Allah's last messenger, Holy Prophet Muhammad was sent to Ummat e muhammadiya to teach them Allah's commandments and the right way to live as the Quran outlines. 
We think that we cannot go to other countries to preach Islam there. That's true but there are simpler ways to do dawah as well. Let's look into them:

First of all, dawah can be done verbally as well as non-verbally. From verbally I mean to say to talk about Islam in gatherings like dars, bayan, some Islamic speech or debate etc. In these areas we speak about Islam, make others realise about this beloved religion and we also tell, share or discuss what Islam teaches us, like we see in the eye-opening spiritual discourses of Maulana Tarig Jamil and Maulana Abdul Sattar Hafidhahullah and how in them they talk about Holy Prophet's & life beautifully co-relating it to ours and enumerating the areas where we lack. They have a lasting impact on people's hearts.

The other and most major way is doing dawah non-verbally. This mainly includes our actions and how we utilise our blessing to do something good. He is doing this dawah 24/7 MashAllah, without even realising it. Same way if a girl is doing pardah, anyone can get motivation from it and that girl will have spontaneously done dawah.

So any good deed we do and others get inspired by it and start doing the same can result in making someone else step a little further into Islam. So why not avail this opportunity of doing that tiny deed too which can earn us the big rewards of doing dawah?



I read a story 'The Wise Young man' in one of the issues of the Radiance Magazine. It told a story of a wise, young man who had three pets. A donkey, a dog and a hen. One day, the hen got killed by a fox. The wife of the young man cried over it. The man consoled his wife by saying that "Everything happens for your own good". Few days later, the fox killed the donkey. Again, the wife of the young man cried over it. The wise man repeated the same words that "Everything happens for your own good". Few days later, their dog died. Once again the man's wife cried over the loss but the man repeated the same words "Everything happens for your own good". After many days, some enemies attacked the town and made everyone prisoner except the man and his wife. Enemies located people through their pets; barking dogs, crowing hens and braying donkeys. Since the man and his wife had none of these pets, they remained safe.
